

Read Easy Shropshire Hills celebrates 5-year milestone helping adults learn to read

Just imagine how your life would be if you couldn't read letters, follow medicine instructions, or read a new recipe? Yet, for many people who missed the opportunity of learning how to read at school, this is the reality they face every day.

Free, confidential, one-to-one help

Read Easy Shropshire Hills, a local volunteer organisation, has been helping adults who struggle with reading for the last five years. During this period over 35 adults have taken the brave decision to come forward and join their confidential, one-to-one coaching programme.

They are paired with a trained reading coach and work together through reading manuals, in private, at a time to suit them both. It's as easy as that and its free!

What's important is that everyone can learn at their own pace without feeling rushed. There's no pressure, or targets, or exams to worry about and no reminders of what it was like at school.

Read Easy now offers coaching beyond the Shropshire Hills area to cover Shrewsbury and its surroundings, North Herefordshire and East Powys. They also offer coaching online which means that the service is accessible during the day and outside working hours.

Anthony learns to read at 60

Anthony found learning to read hard when he was young and moving from school to school didn't help. He fell behind his classmates and in later life came to rely completely on his wife, hiding his struggles with reading from the world. He didn't need to know how to read as she took care of everything.

His world fell apart when his wife died suddenly. Anthony had lost his life partner and the one person who could deal with everything which had to be read. He opened up to friend who encouraged him to get in touch with Read Easy.

Anthony says his confidence has grown so much since he started learning to read. He is getting his life and his bills under control. He now reads a newspaper and books and does things he would never have even considered doing in the past. He even has the confidence to go on walking holidays in Anglesey with plans to venture further afield.



World Prayer Day 1st March

Each year the Church of England chooses a country to pray for and these countries are chosen on a five year rota. This year churches were asked to pray for Palestine, a choice made five years ago, well before the current political situation arose. A good number of people from across the seven churches of our Benefice gathered in St Mary's Church Bucknell for the service and to acknowledge the suffering especially of the women and children in Palestine and to pray for their wellbeing. Churchwarden Debbie and members of the Parish Church Council had worked hard to decorate the church with symbols of Palestinian life including keys which Palestinian people carry as a symbol that they will have a home to return to, poppies and jasmine, and the school children had each made a paper key on which they had written words of hope and peace. A short film of Palestine life accompanied by music was shown on a television screen and each person was gifted a hand made book mark bearing a painted olive branch. Embroidered fridge



magnets bearing a cross were also handed out as a reminder of the service and the promises of peace that were made. A selection of cakes, biscuits and savouries all of Palestine origin along with tea and coffee was served after the service which created a lovely friendly atmosphere as everyone tucked in, chatting happily.





News from the Police

Rogue Traders

Locally we have had an increase in suspect rogue traders offering 'services'. Rogue traders are people who call at your door pretending to be qualified tradespeople and offering to do work on your home. They may suggest urgent repairs need carrying out at your home. They may pressurise you to make quick decisions to have work done, pay in advance for materials or do poor work at highly inflated prices.

Doorstep cold-calling is not illegal, however our advice is to never employ traders who call at your door unannounced.

- Be cautious; if a trader knocks at your door, do not agree to on the spot house repairs without taking advice. Say 'no thank you' and close the door.
- Be wary of special offers. They will use tactics such as 'I am only in your area today and would need to do the work now'.
- Do not believe when told that guttering, roofing, gardening or paving work is in need of urgent repair this may cause you to panic and allow the work to take place.
- Don't allow anyone to pressure you into agreeing to have work carried out. If you ask them
 to leave and they don't, they are committing a criminal offence contact the police on 999
- Do not make snap decisions. If you feel that any work needs carrying out on your property, take time to talk to family or neighbours before you make a decision.
- Don't ever go to a bank or cash point with a trader; legitimate traders would never do this!

Remember.....it's OK to say no!

If you feel you have been a victim of rogue traders, you can report suspicious callers to Trading Standards, the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline number at 0808 223 1133, or West Mercia Police on 101 or 999 in the event of an emergency.

Burglaries and thefts

The beginning of January has seen a spike in burglaries for the area, particularly at farms where quads, plant, trailers and 4x4's have been targeted. This mimics a similar spike of local farm burglaries and thefts that occurred during January 2023, however the county as a whole and neighbouring counties has seen a similar increase in burglaries over recent months.

Most of the burglaries have occurred in the early hours but one of the farm thefts happened rather brazenly during the early afternoon where opportunist thieves have entered a farm yard and stolen a quad with keys.

BUCKNELL NEW VILLAGE HALL

UPDATES FROM JANUARY AND FEBRUARY 2024

The Public Consultation Event held jointly by the Memorial Hall Committee and Liverpool University School of Architecture on 14 October was well attended and more than 24 people left written comments in the suggestions box. These comments have been analysed by the University team and will be taken into account as the design of the New Hall is developed.

Prince Architects of Liverpool were appointed by the Memorial Hall Committee in December to work in collaboration with the School of Architecture to move the project forward to the next stage. Following this appointment a Pre-Planning Advice request was submitted to Shropshire Council on 14 December based on the designs presented at the October Consultation Event. This provides an opportunity to respond to community feedback and to discuss the proposals with Planning Officers prior to the submission of a full planning application later this year.

Shropshire Council have now responded to the request for Pre-Planning Advice submitted to Council on 14 December.

The County Planning Officer states that the "principle of a new community hall on the (Daffodil Lane) site is acceptable and supported by policy". The Planning Officer confirms that, whilst full detailed plans are required to fully assess the proposal, the proposed design is also acceptable.

In his response the Planning Officer has queried the size of the proposed new building when compared to the size of the existing Memorial Hall clearly without appreciating that the proposals include the phase (2) extension. He has also expressed a preference to siting the building closer to Chapel Lawn Road.

These comments will be discussed in some detail when we meet the Planning Officer on site later this month.

Shropshire Council Highways state that "the proposal is acceptable in principle from a highways and transportation perspective". They have set down, in some detail, the further information required when a detailed planning application is made including for example: access visibility splays, signage, parking facilities, bin storage and collection areas.

Shropshire Council Ecology have been unable to comment until they receive detailed information relating to drainage and foul water treatment and discharge. This information will be supplied with the full planning application later this year.

Dr Martin Quayle writes: Yesterday, I walked past the premises of the Co-op funeral directors in Leominster. They advertised in their window display different types of funerals which they offered to those looking for something 'different', when the time came for a death to be remembered. There were different ideas of how to do this which were personal, individual and mostly quirky. Reflecting on this, I thought that although this looks initially exciting and liberating, it would land a terrible burden upon any next of kin who had to carry through such a 'service'.

Death is something which comes to all of us. For some it may be sudden or even unexpected. For others it could follow illness or disability, and although ideally a peaceful passing, for some, death can be wretched, either in relation to physical pain, or sometimes psychologically upsetting or disturbing. Circumstances vary, and for most, they have little choice about what happens during their passing. Some approach death with great maturity and bravery. Others less so. Some may not understand what is happening to them, and this can have a profound effect on those left behind. Grief, or bereavement is complicated, and for some it follows a predictable and straightforward pattern. Others may find themselves stuck in circles of grief and despair, and don't find ways of coming to terms with what has happened.

With the Co-op approach, it may work well for some, but for others, having to find answers to impossibly deep and troubling questions, whilst designing a service or memorial for a loved one, can be agonising and disabling. With the obligation to 'start from scratch', and design 'a wheel', most would be weighed down by the impossible task of working out what it means to die, and how we make sense of such painful events, especially when it is someone close to us, or someone we love.

For those of us of Faith, death and life events may be mysteries in which there are complications and complexities. But Faith brings hope and can liberate us from the despair which sometimes accompanies bereavement. In the Anglican funeral service, there is a focus on the resurrection as a reason for hope and encouragement to believe that death is not an end, but a transition to another phase of life. Regardless of what anyone may think or believe, none of us actually knows what happens. Moreover, there is a choice as to what our approach may be. Life and love, are miracles. Christians believe that death encompasses miracles as well.

The Anglican church offers something in which there is engagement with optimism and hope, so that in death, we are moving into something which is liberating and a fulfilment of our longings and dreams. Regardless of what anyone thinks, Faith offers hope at what for many is the bleakest and most dark of times. Our prayer book was written in one of the darkest periods of our national history. The Civil War had recently ended. The Great Fire of London and the Plague were about to start. When they said, 'In life, there is death', they knew this all too well and all too frequently. And yet they found within Faith reasons to find hope and optimism that death held beginnings as well as endings.

Anglican Priests are trained to deliver pastoral care, which is available to all in a parish - to those of faith, of no faith or for those who simply don't know or care about faith. Funerals and pastoral care have the purpose of enabling those left to acknowledge a death, to have a safe place in which to grieve, and to find reasons for hope and optimism in times of distress and loss. In my experience, when I am able to provide the care that I am trained to deliver and want to provide, then those who are bereaved find recovery and solace through and after a funeral. For those taking the 'Co-op option', it is a very tall order to learn to do something like this with the structure and depth of tradition and experience which Anglicanism can bring and offer to those who are bereaved.


